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February, 2024 A Letter from Pastor Hansen

Presbyterians like to talk about being a "connectional" church. It's not that other denominations are not connectional; we just like to say that we are. Part of our connections come from how we organize ourselves. My father, a now-retired American Baptist minister, likes to tease me that the Baptists got their name from the Sacrament of Baptism, but Presbyterians took their name from their form of government. He's right. Unlike the Roman Catholics, the Lutherans, the Episcopalians, and others who have bishops, we have presbyteries.

Presbyteries do a lot. I am serving here because the Presbytery of Eastern Oregon recognized that I needed to explore a call to ministry and agreed to partner with me as we worked together to determine whether I really was called to ministry as a pastor. The work I did with the Presbytery of Eastern Oregon was recognized and validated by the Presbytery of Geneva when it voted to ordain and install me as your pastor. Along the way, I spent time as an intern in the Presbytery of Philadelphia's Incubator Program with Tree of Life Church and interned at Broad Street Ministry, a ministry that started with the blessing and support of the Presbytery of Philadelphia.

I can trace the renewal of my sense of call to pastoral ministry to my time as a Ruling Elder Commissioner from the Presbytery of Eastern Oregon to the Synod of the Pacific and to the General Assembly. Without the Presbytery of Eastern Oregon and its support, I would not be here as your pastor. And without the Presbytery of Geneva, two members of our own congregation would not be slated to represent our presbytery at this year's General Assembly in Salt Lake City, Utah.

Part of being connectional is supporting our presbyteries by volunteering our time and our resources. As a congregation, we support our presbytery in a number of ways. North has a history of ruling elders and pastors serving on committees, such as the Camp Whitman Committee. When I came here, I agreed to be an active and supportive member of our presbytery. We also support it financially with per capita payments and with mission funding.

As a congregation, we voluntarily support our presbytery by honoring its request that we pay per capita of \$50 per member. Of the \$50, \$36.77 stays with the presbytery, \$4.25 goes to the Synod of the Northeast, and \$8.98 goes to the General Assembly. *This is not a membership fee.* By allocating per capita by membership, the larger churches, who should be more financially able to support the presbytery, pay more than the smaller churches.

We also voluntarily pledge to pay mission funds. Our mission support helps fund Camp Whitman and other ministries. Our food pantry has received grant funding from our presbytery for special projects, such as for our personal needs program.

Please consider helping our congregation pay per capita for this upcoming year. Mark your envelope, the envelopes in the pews, write in the memo of your check, or if you give online, you can give an additional donation as "per capita." Every bit helps our congregation support our presbytery, our fellow congregations, and our past, current, and future pastors, commissioned ruling elders, and ministries in our presbytery and throughout the world.

By joining together with other congregations and other Presbyterians what seems to be not a lot goes a really long way.

Register for free online PC(USA) book study of 'Poverty, by America'


Pulitzer Prize-winning author Matthew Desmond to make a guest appearance

LOUISVILLE — The Pulitzer Prize-winning author of "Poverty, by America" will take part in the kickoff of a four-week book study being held next month by the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.).

Registration is <u>open now</u> for the free online study, which will feature Matthew Desmond in the Feb. 5 session. Discussions will continue each Monday in February to help give participants a heightened understanding of the insidious nature of systemic poverty.

"It's not about people being lazy, not all those things we have traditionally talked about regarding personal responsibility," said the Rev. Dr. Alonzo Johnson, coordinator of the <u>Presbyterian Committee on the Self-Development of People</u> (SDOP), one of several ministries involved in the book study.



In "Poverty, by America," Desmond, a sociologist who won the Pulitzer for a previous book, "Evicted," argues that poverty exists because many people and corporate America profit from it.

"I wrote this book because children by the millions are not getting enough to eat in the richest



country on the planet," Desmond says in a <u>YouTube clip</u> about the book. He also refers to poverty as a "capability destroyer" and a "dream killer" and urges people to become "poverty abolitionists."

The Rev. Rebecca Barnes, coordinator of the <u>Presbyterian Hunger Program</u>, said, "In this book study we hope as many Presbyterians as possible can listen, learn, and share together about the author's premises and our own experience and knowledge of root causes of poverty."

Johnson said the book has much to offer to help people's understanding and to motivate them.

"This book is very detailed and thorough in laying out the intersections of systemic poverty — everything from mental health, employment, gender, and a whole plethora of issues — and it is clear about the way the systems contribute to poverty in a way that is not partisan," Johnson said.

"This book is very approachable."



A few chapters a week will be covered in the 7:30 p.m. Eastern Time book study, and breakout rooms will be available for people who want to have conversations in smaller settings about specific questions and personal connections.

The book study is being organized by a poverty consulting group of Presbyterian national staff, mid council staff and volunteers, and some Presbyterians "at large" who've met monthly and worked for a number of years on eradicating systemic poverty, one of the foci of the PC (USA)'s Matthew 25 invitation.

"The group read and discussed this book together last year and wanted to then be able to offer it to the wider church," Barnes said. "We hope that after the book study, folks will take it to their own churches or book groups or presbytery spaces."

In the YouTube clip, Desmond encourages viewers to work to fight poverty by taking steps such as examining their own consumer choices and supporting affordable housing in their communities.

"It is exciting that author Matthew Desmond will be with us for the beginning of this denominational-wide Matthew 25 book study on poverty," said the Rev. Carl Horton, coordinator of the <u>Presbyterian Peacemaking Program</u>. "It is our hope that Mr. Desmond will provide helpful background to the book for our readers and that he will challenge the PC(USA) and its members, congregations and mid councils to meaningful action to alleviate poverty."



Efforts already are underway by the denomination and its partners.

"The author talks a lot at the end of the book about fusion coalitions — building relationships and networks with people to end poverty," Barnes said. "Presbyterians already have multiple strong relationships, organizations and outlets through which we can take action," including <u>Compassion</u>, <u>Peace and Justice ministries</u> such as SDOP and PHP, and the action alerts of the <u>Presbyterian Office</u> of Public Witness.

Furthermore, "we also have ecumenical and interfaith places to join ongoing work, such as the <u>Poor People's Campaign</u> and the <u>Kairos Center</u>, and international work to eradicate poverty through mission coworkers and global networks," Barnes noted.

Available resources from the consulting group include a <u>poverty resource packet</u> and recordings of last year's online <u>workshop series on poverty</u>.

Communications - The Fruit of the Spirit

"But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. Against such things there is no law." Galatians 5:22-23 (NIV)

We hear these words almost every Sunday during the worship service before we give one another a quick wave or fist bump. When we accept Jesus as our Lord and Savior we are filled with the Holy Spirit. The Spirit within us is exhibited by how we share these good things. The Rev. Gentleness – putting ourselves in someone else's shoes, compassion, empathy

Self-Control – being OK without getting our own way

Sometimes we are moved to give up something during Lent as a way of sacrificing for the One who sacrificed everything for us. We may be moved to do just that, but what if we add some good things to our lives. Look at the list above from Rev. Wagner – what would our days look like if we lived our faith?

Pray – each week during Lent focus on two or three of the gifts and ask Jesus to bring these into your life. God wants to answer our prayers, and when we ask for what He longs to give us it helps us grow closer to Him.

Each of these attributes benefits us – they are all good things! When we are filled with the Fruit of the Spirit it will overflow out of us into our families, our workplaces, our schools.

Each of us can change the world - not through anything in our power, but through the power of Christ. Please open yourself up to the love and gifts your Father has for you.



NPC Board of Session

Session Summary
January 21, 2024 (noon meeting)

The Clerk determined that a quorum was present.

Rev. Hansen called the meeting to order, and the meeting was opened with devotions and prayer led by Wendy Swatling.

The agenda was approved as amended.

The minutes of the December 17, 2023 stated Session meeting were reviewed and approved as submitted.

Session reviewed the Financial Statements including the Profit and Loss Budget Performance for December 2023 and the Account Activity Summary for the Endowment Fund. Pledge income was down \$2,341 from the budgeted amount but recorded income for 2023 was higher for non-pledge income. Endowment transfers were \$22,857 above the budget draw for 2024. The Endowment Fund performed wonderfully in December with \$7,325 in income and a positive market value change of more than \$70,000. The Treasurer's report was received, with thanks, by the Session.

Pastor Hansen reported that he continues to visitation with homebound members both in person and via telephone. He has been meeting every-other Friday with the "YOUMARCO" group. He officiated a funeral service of a non-member at a local funeral home in January.

Written reports were received from Christian Education, Communications & Technology, Finance, and Nominating Committees.
