January, 2024 A Letter from Pastor Hansen

Sometimes before I write this, I go back and look at what I wrote for past newsletters. In part, it is to avoid writing the same thing over and over again. I also think it is useful to look back and reflect on what I have done before. It is a snapshot of a past time and past thoughts. It can be like looking at a photo album. There are pictures you like and pictures that cause you to wonder what you were thinking when you took the picture much less decided to put it in an album.

Bookshelves can be like that. Although I have removed books from my collection over the years due to various moves, looking at one of my bookshelves can be like looking into my past. There are geological-like layers of books from various phases of my life which document how my reading interests have changed over the years and how I have changed over the years.

We all change. Try as we might, none of us stay the same. Our bodies change. Our views change. Our experiences change. Our friends and families change as well. There is no stopping the changes that come with time. To live is to change as we move from past into present and into future.

There is a certain grace to change. I am not chained to my past reading choices or the views I may have once had. I am allowed to be different, I am, we are, allowed to change. This does not mean that all changes are welcome ones or that some changes will not leave us in profound mourning and grief. Just as some changes give us profound joy and hope.

The faith given to us by the Holy Spirit is a faith informed by God's revelation in Christ Jesus and the faith of those who came before us. It is this faith that frees us to change and to follow God in our present and to have hope in the fulfillment of God's promises in our future. It is not a faith that is meant to stand still. It is a faith given to us by the Holy Spirit, which Jesus describes as being like the wind. "The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes." (John 3:8). And it is the faith and hope given to us by the ever -moving Holy Spirit that guides us and transforms us as a community and as people.

In this coming year, the Spirit will continue to do what the Spirit does every day of our lives. The Spirit will challenge us, will lead us into new places and new ministries, and will call us to change. We will be transformed by the grace and love of our God – together. And I, for one, am glad that I am able to go into the new year with all of you and to see where God is taking us and how God will change us.



Per capita is crucial to the overall health of the PC(USA), because it binds presbyteries, synods, and congregations together in one church.

WHY PER CAPITA

Each year, Presbyterians across the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) make a commitment to support one another through per capita giving. This call to generosity is deeply rooted in the values that guide what it means to be a Presbyterian:

We are a priesthood of all believers. All people are equally created and called by God to serve God's church. As a part of this call, we share in the responsibility of supporting the church.

We are a connectional church. No worshipping community is isolated. Rather, the whole of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) is called to work with one another in making ministry possible. Congregations, presbyteries, synods, denominational offices, and more work with one another to offer support, guidance, collaboration, and other opportunities through per capita funding.

All worshipping communities are equally important and valuable to God's church. All

congregations are given equal access to resources and support funded by per capita. Through sharing of financial responsibility, no congregation is privileged due to their financial capacity.

We can only be the church with one another.

Through sharing in generous support of per capita and participating in the opportunities per capita funds, the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) uplifts and empowers all worshipping communities as an integral part of being the church.

In these and in many other ways, per capita giving is shaped by the call that God has extended for us all to join in the pursuit and formation of God's kin-dom. By gathering together in per capita giving, the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) commits to connection and is empowered to live out the ministry of the church.

PER CAPITA MAKES IT POSSIBLE

At its heart, per capita enables ministries that seek to discern God's call and support the health of the church. These ministries reach congregations, mid councils, and assembly work in a variety of ways, including:

- Supporting those called into ministry through the ordination process and equipping both congregations and ministers to discern relationships and calls;
- Empowering mid councils, including Korean speaking non-geographic presbyteries, in equipping leaders and engaging with their communities;
- Holding one another accountable and upholding the constitution of the church through judicial processes;
- Building relationships with ecumenical and interreligious partners to strengthen God's work in the world at-large;
- Preserving the history of the church through the Presbyterian Historical Society, so that we may build bridges between who we have been, who we are, and who we are called to be;

- Embracing the church's support of just immigration through accompanying members and councils as they navigate both joining the church and welcoming into the church;
- Encouraging and equipping leaders to pursue the ministries to which God is calling them through service to assembly committees and mid council roles;
- Pursuing personal and communal opportunities to embrace the diversity of God's creation through church policies and procedures;
- and providing for an equitable and inclusive General Assembly, where members from across the church gather together to discern God's will for the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) in a worshipful community.


HOW PER CAPITA WORKS

Commissioners to each General Assembly approve a per capita rate for the next two years. This rate is based on member statistics submitted by mid councils, ongoing work supported by per capita, and any actions taken by the current assembly which require additional financial support. Ultimately, all ministries funded by the per capita rate are the result of assembly actions. This means that per capita serves as the primary funding source for the many ministries teaching and ruling elders have discerned to be integral to the life of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). As per capita is rooted in the vision of each General Assembly, the Office of the General Assembly is the primary home for these ministries.

The denominational per capita rate approved by the 225th General Assembly (2022) is: 2023 \$9.85 2024 \$9.80

Following the assembly, mid councils are notified of their per capita responsibility as determined by the number of members in their presbytery. Mid councils then add to the General Assembly per capita rate, their own per capita apportionment. This final rate is shared with congregations and members, allowing all to contribute to the work of the church throughout the councils to which they belong.

Despite the increased demand for innovative support and decreasing numbers of members sharing in per capita, the <u>General Assembly rate</u> has stayed largely consistent over the past 10 years, rising only \$2.93 per member.



GIVING TO PER CAPITA


When a congregation gives to per capita, the gifts first go to the presbytery and synod. Each of these mid councils determines the per capita rate for their work and how they allocate denominational per capita from the congregation's overall per capita gift. Typically, the per capita dollars which move through mid councils to the denomination are around 25% of the total per capita given, with 75% going to mid councils and their ministries.

Presbytery leaders who coordinate per capita use an online platform called "Payer Express" which allows for presbyteries to see the per capita total based on their membership statistics, as well as giving history and remaining balances. Staff in the Office of the General Assembly work closely to coordinate this process with mid council leaders.

From there, per capita is used to fund the work of the Office of the General Assembly, as well as some shared efforts with the Administrative Services Group and Presbyterian Mission Agency. Per capita truly is a connectional commitment to the Presbyterian Church (USA) at every level. It is a way to say that this church matters and is called to continue ministry in the world!

CHRISTMAS JOY SPECIAL OFFERINGS CHURCH LEADERS—PAST, PRESENT AND FUTURE



If the life of faith is like running a race, Mikayla Rose Sierra is leading the field.

A two-time state champion in the 300-meter hurdles — as well as a stand-out in volleyball and basketball — Mikayla is a 17-year-old high school senior who entered the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)-related <u>Menaul School</u> in the sixth grade. A member of the Navajo (Diné) [di-nay] Nation, Mikayla considers Menaul to be her home.

"Menaul raised me in a way," she says of the college preparatory day and boarding school in Albuquerque.

"Since my mom worked full-time for the airlines, she was sometimes gone for four or six days at a time. My dad was going through his own challenges as he managed his business, causing him to be gone a lot due to work."

Mikayla's life-changing experience at Menaul — both in the sports arena and in the classroom — is made possible, in part, by gifts to the PC(USA)'s <u>Christmas Joy Offering</u>, which helps the school provide scholarships to exceptional students.

The annual Offering distributes gifts equally to <u>Presbyterian-related schools and colleges equipping</u> <u>communities of color</u> and the <u>Assistance Program</u> of the <u>Board of Pensions</u>.

Off the field, Mikayla has developed and matured into an amazing young woman. "Mikayla exemplifies the mission of Menaul School in that she is strong in mind, body and spirit," said Melanie G. Davis, director of Institutional Advancement. "Proud to be Native American, Mikayla embraces her classmates at Menaul and their cultures from around the world."

Mikayla shares that the Menaul community has helped her to grow in a variety of ways, including spiritually.

"I have definitely noticed an increase in my prayer life in recent years," she said. "Chapel at Menaul always gives us a moment of reflection when we get to pray and give thanks for what we do have rather than being annoyed at what we might not have. I'm Native American so we also have a spiritual connection to the earth."

When she graduates from Menaul, Sierra looks forward to becoming a lawyer because she wants to help people, just as her coaches, teachers and the Christmas Joy Offering have helped her. Her future is bright. And maybe one day she really will run the world; or at least a corner of it.

When we give to the Christmas Joy Offering, we share our love with the leaders of our Church — past, present and future. Please share your gifts with those share their gifts with us. When we all do a little, it adds up to a lot.

If home is where the heart is, then Sue Anne Fairman's heart is blessed to call several places home. For Sue Anne, a deacon and ruling elder, home is New Wilmington, Pennsylvania. It is also home to the New Wilmington Presbyterian Church, which supported her family during many years as international mission workers.



But home, too, will always be Kenya, where the family lived and worked among the Maasai people. It was there that Sue Anne raised her two daughters and spent 14 of her nearly 25 years in mission service volunteering at Mother Teresa's Orphanage in Nairobi. She recalls, "Our family's years in southwestern Kenya were the most difficult. I think this was the most formative time of my life."

But as we age, things change — and home may come to mean someplace else. For Sue Anne, that place is Shenango on the Green, a Presbyterian continuing care community.

When initially faced with the financial realities of moving, she was feeling "more than a bit stressed." She said, "I had lunch with my friend Dave (David Dawson, former executive presbyter of Shenango Presby-tery), who said, 'Why don't you apply to the <u>Board of Pensions</u> for income and housing assistance.' He explained that the Board of Pensions of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) is there for retired pastors and mission workers facing financial need."

Sue Anne made the call, and good news was soon to follow.

The support that she receives is made possible, in part, by the annual <u>Christmas Joy Offering</u>, which distributes gifts equally to the Assistance Program of the Board Of Pensions and to <u>Presbyterian-related</u> <u>schools and colleges equipping communities of color</u>.

Most of Sue Anne's years of service as a pastor's wife and missionary in Kenya were not covered by the Board of Pensions, because her ex-husband was the one who was called into ministry. This meant she wasn't afforded full benefits by the Board of Pensions. This meant she wasn't afforded full benefits by the Board of Pensions. But, with the Board's commitment to diversity, equity and inclusion, the Assistance Program expanded access to existing programs and created new ones. Now pensioners, like Sue Anne, who served the church for many years without full benefits, may be eligible to receive support. Sue Anne shares, "Church workers who have served long and well deserve to be recognized for their efforts. There are many today who are struggling financially because of inflation and other challenges. Your gifts validate their life and their ministry."

Please support the Christmas Joy Offering. For as we always say ... when we all do a little, it adds up to a lot.





NPC Board of Session

Session Summary December 17, 2023 Quarterly Dinner meeting

The Clerk determined that a quorum was present.

Rev. Hansen called the meeting to order, and the meeting was opened with Scripture and prayer by Linda Palmer.

The minutes of the November 19, 2023 stated Session meeting were reviewed and approved as submitted.

Session reviewed the Financial Statements including the Profit and Loss Budget Performance for November 2023 and the Account Activity Summary for the Endowment Fund. The Endowment Fund "bounced back" in November with a positive market change of \$128,000. The Treasurer's report was received, with thanks, by the Session.

Session reviewed the 2024 NPC Budget as proposed by the Finance Committee. Session approved the budget as amended (\$1,800 increase in Account 5103 – Pension/Benefits).

Communion dates for 2024 were approved (see attached).

Session approved the date for the Annual Meeting of the Congregation for January 21, 2024 immediately following worship.

Session agreed to postpone moving the Sunday School classrooms to the first floor. Session recommends one of the following dates for the move: 2/10, 3/9, 4/13. Wendy Swatling will ask the new Co-Chairs of the Christian Education Committee which date in 2024 works the best for teachers.

Following dinner, a discussion was held regarding chapters 2 and 3 of "Loving the Church You Lead".

The meeting adjourned in prayer at 7:45 p.m.
