October, 2025 A Letter from Pastor Hansen

I recently came across an article in the New York Times titled "What Does It Take to Get Men to See a Doctor." (NY Times Online Edition, August 25, 2025). The answer, it turns out, is really complicated. The result is not so complicated. Men die sooner than women. The average life expectancy for a man is 75.8 years which is 5.3 years less than the average life expectancy for a woman. While it is not all about not going to the doctor, the lack of consistent medical care contributes to men having, on average, a shorter life span than women.

This led me to wonder why it can be so hard to ask for help – not just for men – but for everyone. We do not start off that way. When we are born, we are helpless. We quickly learn how to get the attention of people around us so that we get help. We quickly learn because without help, we will die.

As we grow up, we slowly learn how to ask for help in ways that do not always involve crying. We also learn to try to do things on our own. And as much as we are told that we need to learn how to do things on our own, there are times when every parent, grandparent, babysitter, caretaker, or teacher wishes that we had asked for help instead of trying to do it ourselves.

As we get older, we learn that "being independent" is a good thing; "being dependent" is a bad thing. And there is a temptation, as followers of Christ, to embrace the "being independent" is a good thing; "being dependent" is a bad thing as if it were, not only the gospel message, but the reality in which we live.

But nothing could be further from the gospel or the reality in which we live. There is nothing about the grace of God that does not require us to not only accept our utter dependence on God and others, but to embrace it wholeheartedly. To pray, whether it is on our own behalf or on the behalf of others, is an admission of our dependence on God and others. And if we think we are otherwise independent and self-reliant, where does the air that we need to breathe to live come from? Not us.

Someone remarked in Adult Sunday School that doctors and nurses, medical treatments, and the like, are miracles from God. I do not disagree. Antibiotics, vaccines, other types of medicines, medical treatments, etc., are miraculous. So is the fact that there are people who care enough to learn how to take care of us.

Maybe having faith in Jesus Christ is not about having a faith in which there are no doubts but one in which we are unafraid to ask God and others for help. And if that is the case, when we do not ask others for help or admit that we need help, including medical help, we are not demonstrating independence at all. Rather, we are showing how little we truly understand the grace and love of the God who cares for us in so many ways, including by inspiring us and others to care for those who need help – and we all need help.

RH, where my sins faded lesser and lesser,


RH, where diseased wood became another man's treasure.

Coalition of Immokalee Workers (Immokalee, Florida)

Mobilized 600 marchers on the March for Farmworker Freedom and continues to witness great Fair Trade Program expansion — now in 10 states and working with salmon fisherfolk in Chile, as well as with organizations in the UK and India. A tangible result is that \$50 million in Fair Food premiums have been paid to workers since 2011. In 2024 alone, \$53,576 has been recovered in stolen wages. Forced labor, sexual assault, and other forms of abuse have also been virtually eliminated from participating farms.




Ekvn-Yefolecv (a Maskoke community in Alabama)

Is now home to the only fluent-speaking Maskoke children on the planet, thanks to their language immersion schooling program. Additionally, they have successfully rematriated 5,584 acres of traditional Maskoke homelands, bringing their total stewarded land base to 6,824 acres, and have made significant progress in ecological restoration and regenerative agriculture, including silvopasture, tree-planting, and restoring southeastern grasslands.



Praja Abhilasha (Sri Lanka)

Played a crucial role in reclaiming 254 acres of land for displaced families, actively engaging 2,451 women in land rights campaigns and ensuring that women had a voice in policy advocacy while also addressing issues of food sovereignty and economic security.



Kasupe Ministries (Malawi)

Supported 15,181 cyclone-affected individuals by providing seeds, farm tools, and training in organic farming.



Hope Restoration South Sudan

Empowered over 20,000 women and girls by raising awareness about gender-based violence, providing vocational training in tailoring and bead-making, and improving economic self-sufficiency to reduce dependency and vulnerability.



Koreatown Immigrant Workers

In 2024, KIWA organizers and canvassers conducted thousands of house visits and had tens of thousands of conversations with community members, who make up one of the largest immigrant populations in Los Angeles County. In 2024, KIWA was a coalition partner with the SoCal Black Worker Hub's successful campaign to pass SB 1340, antidiscrimination legislation that increases the state's capacity to fight discrimination and enforce workplace discrimination laws. KIWA also strongly advocated for and persistently supported implementation of Measure ULA (United to House LA), which has generated critical funding for affordable housing and homelessness prevention.

What impact does long-term, relational partnership have?

The work of the Presbyterian Hunger Program (PHP) and our partners is difficult to quantify in the short term. Sustainable development, community empowerment, and policy change are needed to end hunger. Any progress achieved in these long-term goals is years, if not decades, in the making. Our relatively small investments in partner organizations allow them to:

- demonstrate trustworthiness to larger funders in order to secure their work into the future;
- expand the skill sets of their staff and community leaders;
- garner respect from other NGO and governmental partners to establish themselves as conversation partners for a more hopeful future;
- grow the number of beneficiaries;
- weather financial hardships from war, famine, disease, and economic precarity; and
- know they are not alone in working to build a better world and more hopeful future where hunger and poverty no longer exist.

Meanwhile, we benefit from their wisdom and trust in us, as we learn together how to do global partnership in mutual and respectful ways. The following responses illustrate what longer-term solidarity and mutual relationships mean to partners with whom we work.

Viviana Moreno, Little Village Environmental Justice Organization Chicago

"As we continue to establish La Villita Farm, the Presbyterian Hunger Program's role in ensuring we had a solid ground to stand on has made it possible for our farm team to invest in their cultivation skills, our community base has grown significantly, and the amount of food we've produced has more than tripled since we broke ground in 2021."

"Since 2005, the Presbyterian Hunger Program has supported communities affected by the 2004 tsunami, aiding in resistance to land grabs and empowering people to reclaim their rights. PHP promoted social justice, reconciliation, and political empowerment, helping displaced Tamil communities regain land and strengthening grassroots movements."

Knit one, pray too

Thriving prayer blanket ministry renews small upstate New York congregation and everyone it touches

From the banks of the Genesee River to South Carolina's sunny shores, God's love is on the move.

And in the mail.

The latest in a wealth of colorful prayer blankets — lovingly handcrafted by a group of faithful volunteers at the <u>First Presbyterian Church of East Avon</u> (New York) in the <u>Presbytery of Genesee Valley</u> — was dispatched last Sunday to a South Carolina woman who had likely never heard of the hamlet south of Rochester, but whose life would be touched by it.

"This past Sunday, we blessed a blanket for a woman named Cas," said Cathy Garrett, a relatively new church member who launched the prayer blanket ministry at East Avon, where she is thrilled to see it flourishing.

"Our friends met Cas while they were serving at the food bank in their hometown in South Carolina." she said. "When they noticed that her leg didn't look healthy, they encouraged her to seek medical attention. Because she has no health insurance, she was resistant to go to the doctor. They, however, continued to encourage her, and when she did finally seek medical attention, the doctor stated that although it was not cancer, the leg would have to be amputated. It's our prayer that she will receive the blanket as a physical symbol of God's love, peace, comfort and healing."

Garrett explained that whenever the congregation receives a request for a prayer blanket, the church's pastor, the Rev. Michelle Allen, invites worshipers to come forward, as they are able, to lay their hands on the blanket and pray as a witness that everyone shares in the ministry.

"Because the Holy Spirit is so present and active at East Avon Church," said Allen, "it is a wonderful blessing for our prayer blanket ministry to be carried by the Spirit throughout the nation and world."

Since East Avon is a small congregation with some 50-60 members and friends worshiping each Sunday in person or on Zoom, Garrett decided that the best way to introduce the prayer blanket concept to the church was to connect with Alice Malin, who leads the Crafters, a longtime weekly ministry group.

"Alice immediately came up with a pattern for people to knit for prayer blankets," said Garrett, who first learned about prayer blankets when she received the prayer shawl that had comforted her mother-in-law at the end of her life.

"As soon as the idea took hold with the Crafters, soon others in the church stepped forward to offer to teach crocheting and knitting," Garrett recalled. "Now everyone in church is involved with the prayer blanket ministry in one way or another, including the children. We have been honored to send blankets all over the world to people we've never met. The stories we receive are incredible."

Peggy Stallworth, a quilter who leads the pack in donating her beautiful, handmade quilts, shared with Garrett how the ministry has brought new meaning to her handiwork.



"Peg, who is one of those who has quilted many of the blankets," recalled Garrett, "said to me, 'I can't thank you enough. I love to quilt, but I ran out of people to give them to, and now I have purpose for my quilts."

Whenever a blanket is hand-delivered or mailed, the church encloses a laminated photo of the congregation praying over it with text on the back to let the recipient know that the church will continue to remember them in prayer. They also invite them to email the church with updates, should they wish, and to join the congregation on Sunday mornings for worship.

"Through its thriving prayer blanket ministry, the East Avon Church bears witness to the Gospel story of the loaves and fishes," said the Rev. Dr. John L. Odom, executive presbyter for the Presbytery of Genesee Valley. "By the power of the Holy Spirit, a small congregation has all the gifts and resources it needs to do miraculous things."

Having seen the impact of the prayer blanket ministry, Garrett would agree.

"We sent a blanket to a woman who wasn't expected to live after a stroke." said Garrett. "She told us that when the blanket isn't on her, it stays in her windowsill with a picture of the congregation next to it. She said she looks at it all day long, and that it has given her strength."

Today, Garrett said, the woman is able to speak and eat, and is learning to walk again.

"What a blessing it would be," she exclaimed, "to have other churches pick up on this practice and just let the Holy Spirit fly!"

Mission & Outreach Committee News

The Mission & Outreach Committee would like to thank the congregation for their continued support of the PCUSA Special Offerings. To date, the following amounts were submitted to the PCUSA Mission Agency on behalf of NPC:

Christmas Joy (Received in 2024/sent in 2025) - \$432.00 One Great Hour of Sharing - \$815.14 Pentecost - \$519.12 (40 percent retained by NPC to support local youth)

In August, \$848.00, the amount retained by NPC for the 2024 and 2025 Pentecost Offering, was sent to the Presbytery of Geneva in support of David Hansen as he attended the Youth Triennium in St. Louis, MO.

In July, \$86.50, the amount retained by NPC for the 2024 Peace and Global Witness Offering was given to the Matsiko Children's Choir.

The Mission Committee has approved the Potter's Hands Foundation as the recipient of NPC's 25% share of the 2025 Peace & Global Witness Offering, which concludes on October 5th. The Potter's Hands Foundation is a local, faith-based, nonprofit organization that is committed to helping survivors of human trafficking as they work through the process of restoration and healing.

Thank you, thank you, for your generosity in supporting the PCUSA Special Offerings.

The congregation continues to support Second Place East, Inc. through various monthly donations. For the months July through August 2025, donations to Second Place East, Inc. included: 11 dessert plates, 4 bottles of multi-cleaner, 7 bottles of dish soap and 14 rolls of toilet paper. Referrals to the program doubled over the summer.

Another local mission supported by the NPC congregation is Renovation House. We are pleased to have the Rev. John Earle and some of the current residents of the program lead worship and share their powerful testimonies on Sunday, October 12, 2025. 


